Conversion Practices

FACT SHEET

What are they?

The Sexuality and Gender Identity Conversion Practices Act 2020 came into force in February 2021. It defines a "conversion practice" as "treatment or other practices" which aim "to change a person's sexuality or gender identity".

This could include a religious or cultural practice.

What conversion practices are criminal offences?

A conversion practice performed on a child or a person with impaired decision-making ability regarding their own health or welfare is a criminal offence even if that child or person, or their parent or guardian, consented to the conversion practice.

It is also a criminal offence to remove a child or a person with impaired decision-making ability from the ACT to have a conversion practice performed on them.

Such offences are punishable by up to 12 months imprisonment and a \$24,000 fine.

How else can conversion practices be dealt with?

- **Stage 1:** If a conversion practice is performed on someone other than a child or a person with impaired decision-making ability, a complaint can be made to the ACT Human Rights Commission (Commission).
- Stage 2: The Commission will try to resolve the complaint through conciliation (an informal, voluntary and flexible approach to assist the parties to reach a mutually agreed upon outcome).
- Stage 3: If the Commission cannot resolve the complaint, they can refer it to the ACT Civil & Administrative Tribunal (ACAT).
- Stage 4: ACAT will consider if the conversion practice performed on an adult without impaired decision-making ability caused, or is likely to cause, harm or adversely affect their rights, interests or welfare.
- Stage 5: If ACAT decides that the person complained about did engage in a harmful practice, ACAT can order that:
 - (a) their conduct not be repeated
 - (b) they address any loss or damage suffered because of the harmful practice
 - (c) they pay compensation
 - (d) any other order ACAT considers appropriate
